Introduction to the guide


Education is a vital field in which you'll facilitate learning, transform lives and inspire futures.

If you're looking to study an Initial Teacher Education (ITE) course, you'll need to submit a Personal Statement as part of your application process. This guide has been created to help you throughout this process, outlining important steps and requirements. We have also included a checklist to follow when you are completing your Personal Statement.


When you have finished reading this guide, you should understand:

- What a Personal Statement is and suggested steps to completing your application.
- What Inherent Requirements are and how they are assessed.









my Personal Statement?

These are the questions you will see when you begin your online Personal Statement. You can use these questions as a reference point for when you begin planning your responses.

You'll need to provide evidence and examples for the following:

1. Communication and relational capabilities

Demonstrate that you have excellent oral and written communication skills in English, and that you have the ability to build and maintain respectful relationships with people from a range of backgrounds and age groups.

2. Self-awareness and self-management

Show that you are self-aware (you know yourself and the impact you may have on others) and are able to regulate your own emotions and behaviour and show resilience, even in stressful situations.

3. Motivation to teach

Why do you want to be a teacher and what you think you can bring to the profession. Go beyond statements such as, "I love working with children/young people".

4. Willingness to learn (including ability to act on feedback)

Demonstrate your willingness to learn, to question your attitudes and beliefs, and your ability to act on the feedback and advice given to you by others.

5. Organisational and planning skills

Showcase your organisational skills and that you and are able to make plans and execute them effectively.

In addition, if you are a Secondary Teaching applicant who completed your degree five or more years ago, you must also address the following in no longer than 250 words:

6. Up to date discipline knowledge

How have you kept up to date in the field in which you plan to work?

Your step-by-step guide

Step 1.

Read over the questionnaire. You might like to make some notes or dot points with ideas for your responses, including relevant experiences or scenarios that may help support your responses. At this stage, you could talk to friends, family or past teachers and tutors who might help you think of these examples.

Step 2.

Draft your responses. You may want to prepare your responses in a separate document before you enter them into your online Personal Statement. It is expected that your Personal Statement includes considered responses with accurate grammar and professional language. Dot points are not acceptable. The use of any form of artificial intelligence (AI) is strictly prohibited in the completion of your Personal Statement. Each response should specifically address all parts of the question and include examples.

Step 3.

Proofread and check over your responses. Use the checklist on page 9 to make sure you are meeting the requirements.

Step 4.

When you are satisfied that you have answered each question to the best of your ability, and your responses are of a high standard, you can enter each response into the online form.

Step 5.

Submit your Personal Statement.

Remember, your Personal Statement is an opportunity to share your passion and motivations for pursuing teaching, as well as experiences that have prepared you for this pursuit.





Personal Statement checklist

Fill out your personal details. Ensure you have your contact details, including student ID (if you have one) or TISC ID ready to fill in.
Answer the five required questions, between 200-300 words per answer.
Use professional language, with accurate grammar and punctuation. Avoid casual language, and write your responses in sentences and paragraphs, not dot points.
Use examples with specific information, for example the names of sporting clubs, organisations and workplaces and how you contributed to them.
Answer one additional question if you are a Secondary Teaching applicant.
Ensure all answers are your own and written by you. The use of any form of artificial intelligence (AI) is strictly prohibited in the completion of your Personal Statement.
Proofread your work.
Sign the declaration that your work is your own.

We suggest you print this page out and use it to guide your Personal Statement submission process.

What are Inherent Requirements?

Inherent requirements identify the core knowledge, skills and abilities that must be met by all students to complete an Initial Teacher Education (ITE) course at UWA.

Your Personal Statement will need to address the following Inherent Requirements:


- · Communication and relational capabilities
- · Self-awareness and self-management

The remaining five Inherent Requirements will be assessed during your course of study. These include:

- · Legal prerequisites
- · Professional knowledge and cognitive skills
- · Physical, motor and sensory capabilities
- · Social awareness and situational management
- Sustained professional conduct in complex educational settings
