




Welcome to **UWA CELT**



Fremantle

Rottnest Island

Karijini National Park



English language pathways to UWA degrees

There are two options for you to improve your English to the level required by UWA for degree entry.

OPTION 1: Academic English and Study Skills Bridging Course (CRICOS course code: 026607K)

If you don't quite meet the English entry requirements for your degree at UWA, the Academic English and Study Skills Bridging Course (Bridging Course) may be the best pathway for you. This is the most common and highly recommended English language pathway, as it offers direct entry into most degrees at UWA.

Specifically designed for international students, this course will enhance your confidence and language skills, better preparing you for the demands of an academic environment before starting your tertiary studies.

The Bridging Course has been granted NEAS Premium Product Endorsement and has three intakes each year, which align with UWA semester start dates. Each intake consists of two 10-week modules: Module 1 and Module 2. Both modules have specific English language entry requirements, as shown in the table below. Module 1 of the course will support your language improvement and skill development, while Module 2 will advance your language skills through research and critical analysis within your discipline area.

The Bridging Course will help you to:

- Improve your English language skills to the level required by UWA.
- Learn about the organisation and language of various types of academic texts.

- Develop knowledge of the language of your chosen discipline.
- Develop an understanding of the Australian academic and research culture.
- Develop a high level of analytical and reflective skills in an Australian academic context.
- Work on a research paper in your discipline area and on research presentations.
- Develop strategies to attribute literary sources appropriately.
- Develop the capacity to be an autonomous learner at an Australian university with the confidence to participate freely and appropriately in academic situations.

A final 70% grade in the Bridging Course meets the English language requirements for most degrees at UWA. Some degrees have higher English entry requirements, and a select few degrees do not have a pathway from the Bridging Course due to post graduation registration requirements that specify an external test. If you are unable to meet the minimum Bridging Course entry requirements, you can start by improving your English in Language and Communication Essentials or English for Academic Purposes.

OPTION 2: English for Academic Purposes + an approved English language examination


If you do not meet the English entry requirements for your UWA degree and need a more adaptable solution, our English for Academic Purposes course in combination with an approved examination, may offer a suitable pathway.

The English for Academic Purposes course is offered in five-week terms with with nine intakes each year, allowing you flexibility in both duration and start dates.

This is the alternative English language pathway, as it does not offer direct entry into UWA degrees. As such, if you choose this option,

you must also sit an approved English language examination (such as IELTS or TOEFL iBT) to meet UWA's English language requirements.



English language programs

UWA CELT offers accredited English language programs from beginner to advanced levels, to help develop your language proficiency. We offer Language and Communication Essentials, English for Academic Purposes and IELTS examination preparation courses throughout the academic year. Choosing the best program will depend on your goals and level of English language ability.



Language and Communication Essentials

Length of course: From 5 to 75 weeks Intake period: 9 intakes each year Mode of study: 20 hours per week CRICOS course code: 029726A Levels offered: Beginner to pre-advanced

The Language and Communication Essentials course supports you to improve your ability to communicate clearly, confidently, accurately and fluently in English. In five-week terms you will learn the grammar, vocabulary, skills, and strategies required for reading, listening, speaking and writing in English. This course is a pathway to all other English language courses at UWA CELT and to UWA College.

English for Academic Purposes

Length of course: From 5 to 15 weeks Intake period: 9 intakes each year Mode of study: 20 hours per week CRICOS course code: 014929B Levels offered: Upper-intermediate to pre-advanced

The English for Academic Purposes course will help you to improve your language ability in preparation for tertiary studies in an English-speaking country. In five-week terms, you will develop listening and note-taking skills, seminar and presentation skills together with academic reading and writing skills. You will also learn to adapt to the academic culture of Australian tertiary institutions.

IELTS Examination Preparation

Length of course: From 5 to 10 weeks Intake period: 6 intakes each year Mode of study: 20 hours per week CRICOS course code: 072182D Levels offered: Upper-intermediate to pre-advanced

UWA CELT delivers preparation courses for the internationally recognised International English Language Testing System (IELTS) examination. There are six terms per year for the intensive 20-hour per week course.

Through this course, you will explore each section of the IELTS examination, acquiring the skills required to improve your score.

Note: The IELTS Examination Preparation course is run based on student demand. Please contact UWA CELT before applying for this course to confirm availability.




Academic progression

If a student group wants to get a taste of UWA, a short-term study tour that combines academic study, Australian culture and English language, could be just the answer. UWA CELT organises three broad categories of Study Tours.

Closed Study Tours

These programs are customised to meet the specific needs of each group and are available to high schools, university faculties, corporations, government agencies and cultural bodies. Students tend stay together in one class and preferably are of similar English language ability.

These individually tailored programs usually fall into one of four types: UWA Experience, Australian Culture: Critical Thinking and Communication, English for Specific Purposes and TESOL Professional Development.

Closed programs can vary in duration (from four days to 12 weeks), are available throughout the academic year, and cater to different levels of English proficiency.

Open Study Tours

This program is a great option for groups of students with different English language abilities. Students will join in one of UWA CELT's English courses including: Language and Communication Essentials, English for Academic Purposes or IELTS Examination Preparation.

Hybrid Study Tours

This is a combination of the open and closed study tours. Students will take part in UWA CELT's open English Language courses in the morning. The afternoon gives students the opportunity to join a custom-tailored program, which could include a focus on a particular discipline area, or participation in cultural activities and excursions, to enrich their experience.




Make friends outside the classroom! UWA CELT runs a variety of student social activities and excursions both on and off-campus.

Feed a kangaroo, pat a koala, hold a snake...these are just a few "up close and personal" experiences you can enjoy at Caversham Wildlife Park.







UWA CELT offers the English pathway to Foundation and Diploma programs at UWA College, and to a number of other institutions in Perth.

UWA College

UWA College's pathway programs are tailored to provide support and additional academic and English language guidance, helping you succeed in your studies at UWA and setting you up for a career that's full of potential. Designed specifically for international students, a UWA Foundation Program will help improve your subject knowledge and English language skills so you can progress to the first year of your bachelor's degree at UWA. Alternatively, UWA College Diploma programs prepare you for entry into the second year of a range of UWA bachelor's degrees, allowing you to complete a UWA bachelor's degree in the standard number of years.

If you've achieved an overall IELTS score of 5.0 or equivalent, you can package a UWA CELT Language and Communication Essentials course with your chosen UWA College pathway and UWA degree. This option gives you everything you need under a single study plan and visa, so you won't have to take another language test on completion. The length of your Language and Communication Essentials course will be between 10 and 30 weeks, depending on your English language proficiency.

If your overall IELTS score is less than 5.0, you'll need a longer English language program to meet the requirements for entry into a UWA College pathway program. In this case, UWA College will provide you with two separate study plans, one for a standalone English language program and one for your packaged UWA College pathway and UWA degree.

With multiple start dates throughout the year, you'll be able to finish your English language program in time to enrol in your UWA College academic program.

There are a number of different ways to apply to UWA CELT, depending on your overall study plan.

1. English only at UWA CELT

If you are applying for the Language and Communication Essentials, English for Academic Purposes or IELTS Examination Preparation courses, visit www.edu.au/celt/courses-and-programs/apply-to-study-at-celt to start your application. You can submit your application with supporting documents directly to UWA CELT by email, or through an authorised education agent listed on our website.

If you have not already taken an approved English language test, the UWA CELT online placement test will be sent to you. The test must be completed in the given time and without any assistance. The results will help identify your current English level and ensure you are in the correct class when you arrive.

Once you have completed the placement test, UWA CELT will send you a letter of offer and acceptance documents. The offer letter will include an invoice for your course, and other applicable fees. To accept your offer, you must pay all fees as outlined in your offer letter, and return the signed acceptance documents to enrolments-celt@uwa.edu.au

2. English as a pathway to a UWA degree

If you are applying for the Bridging Course as part of your pathway into a UWA degree, your application must be submitted online through the **UWA Apply** portal either directly or via an authorised agent. Visit **uwa.edu.au/study/international**

You will receive an email from UWA Admissions notifying you of the outcome of your application. If your application is successful, you will receive a conditional letter of offer. Acceptance for your offer will be through **UWA Apply**.

3. English as a pathway to UWA College

If you are applying for Language and Communication Essentials as a pathway to UWA College, your application should be submitted directly to UWA College. Visit www.uwa.edu.au/uwa-college/apply

4. English as a pathway to another institution

Your English application should be submitted directly to UWA CELT by email, or through a UWA CELT authorised education agent. You will need to submit a copy of your offer letter from TIWA or APSI when applying to UWA CELT.

5. Apply for your visa to match your course and study duration

To study as an international student in Australia, you will need to ensure you have the correct visa type depending on how long you want to study. Each visa type comes with different conditions you must abide by.

It may be possible to study at UWA CELT on visitor, working holiday and student visas. All visa applications are handled by the Australia Government's Department of Home Affairs. For more information about the different types of visas and study conditions, visit homeaffairs.gov.au


